



⊗ **HAND EMBROIDERY**
SKILL LEVEL: **BEGINNER**

INSTRUCTIONS

Note: 6 strands of Anchor Floss unless otherwise noted.

1. Transfer the design to fabric.
2. Using the stitches indicated, embroider the designs.

When embroidering on your jeans, you may need to open up the side seam in order to hoop the fabric. To do that, using a seam ripper, open the seam without the top stitching. If your jeans fabric is heavier, you may find you can stitch the embroidery without hooping it. If you open the seam, you will need to re-sew it on a sewing machine when you have finished embroidering.

Transfer the stems from the design template to your jeans. You should be able to do the rest of the embroidery if you only transfer the stems, but if you feel you need more direction, you can transfer the other shapes as well.

Featuring Anchor® Embroidery Floss Spools

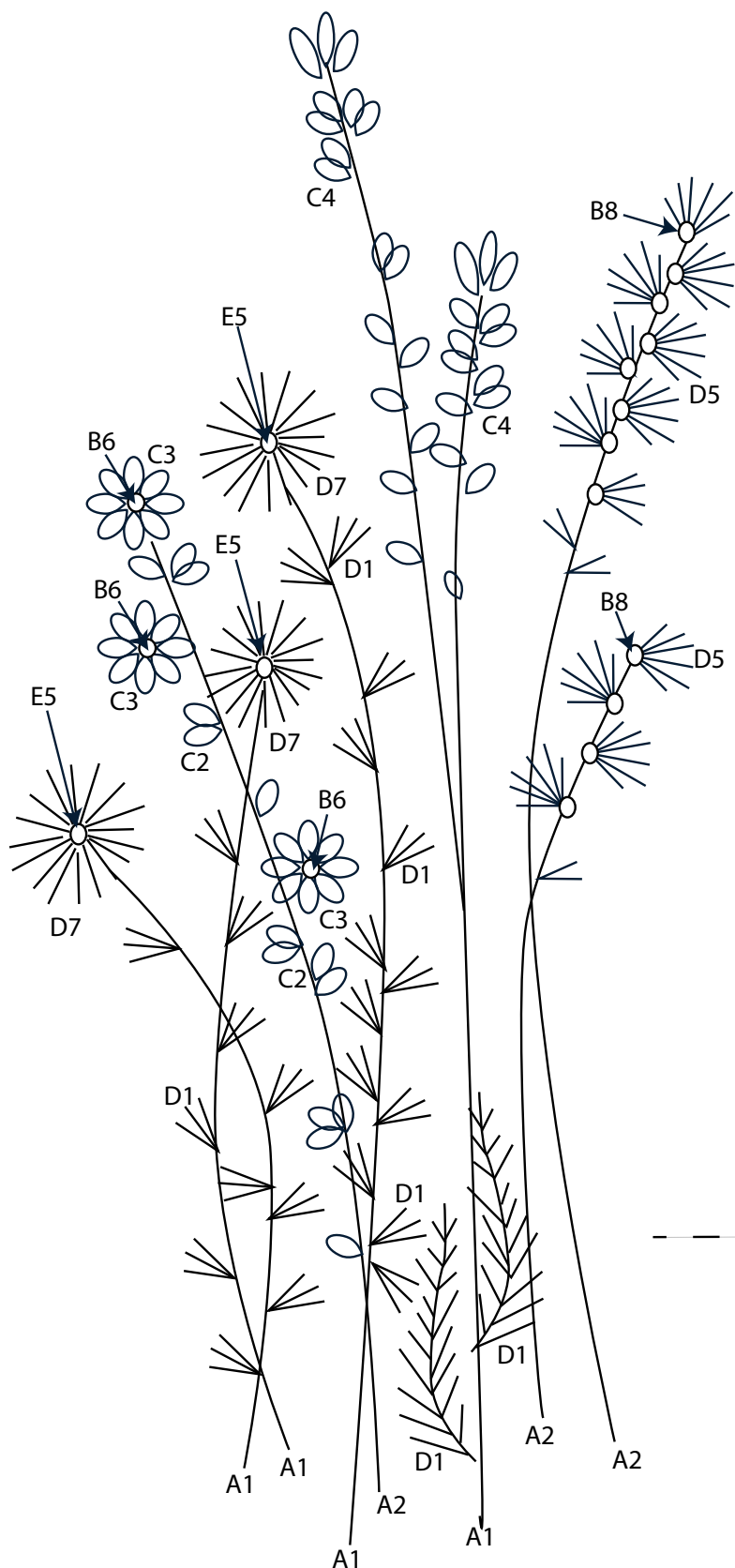
Make your jeans your own with hand embroidery using Anchor® Embroidery floss on spools. Roll the floss off the spool easily with no knots or tangles and get started.

MATERIALS

Anchor® Embroidery Floss Spools: 1 of each color



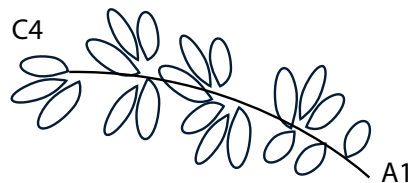
Anchor® Embroidery Hoop, Embroidery or Crewel needle, size 3.
Jeans, Fabric marker for transferring design.



In the diagram, the letter refers to the stitch and the number refers to the color. For example, A1 means to do the split stitch with Anchor® Floss 0845 Fern green med dk

- A Split stitch
- B French knot
- C Lazy daisy
- D Straight (spoke) stitch
- E Satin stitch

- 1 0845 Fern green med dk
- 2 0280 Olive green med
- 3 0062 Magenta med
- 4 0307 Topaz med
- 5 1003 Amberglow
- 6 0303 Citrus med
- 7 1018 Antique mauve dk
- 8 0975 Sea blue lt

STITCHES

TIP: To separate the floss into strands, cut an 18" [45.5 cm] length. Hold one end and run the finger of your opposite hand between the strands allowing them to untwist. Thread the needle.

FRENCH KNOT

A: Needle enters fabric, thread forms a loop.
 B: Thread is wrapped around the needle.
 C: Needle is pulled through the loops.
 D: The knot is tightened and the needle is removed.

LAZY DAISY STITCH

A: Needle enters fabric, thread forms a loop.
 B: Needle is pulled through the loop.
 C: A second loop is added to the side.
 D: The final daisy-like flower shape is complete.

SATIN STITCH

A: Needle enters fabric, thread forms a loop.
 B: Needle is pulled through the loop, creating a series of parallel lines.
 C: The satin stitch is completed, filling the shape.

STRAIGHT STITCH (Spoke Stitch)

A: Needle enters fabric, thread forms a loop.
 B: Needle is pulled through the loop, creating a spoke-like shape.
 C: The final spoke-like shape is complete.

SPLIT STITCH

1: Needle enters fabric, thread forms a loop.
 2: Needle is pulled through the loop, splitting the thread.
 3: The final split stitch is complete.
