ACTIVE TRADE FOR HOLIDAY

Produce Prices Lower Than Year Ago; Meats at Low Level.

Duluth commission houses and produce dealers generally reported a satisfactory holiday trade in all lines. In addition to taking care of an active demand from local retailers, heavy shipments were made over the range tows, so that supplies arranged for in advance were well distributed.

That costs of living, in the produce line at least, are coming down was shown in the fact that with the exception of oranges and bananas, all the leading items in the fruits and vegetables line are quoted lower than a year ago.

A big item has come about in apples, which are now quoted at \$5.67 a barrel, with the exception of Jonathans and nips, at this time last year. As a result of the lower quotations and warmer weather conditions, dealers have experienced a good movement in apples during the last few days.

New Oranges In. Scales of oranges for the holiday trade were liberal and commission men are in better position to take care of the trade than in some time back. A car of new Florida navel oranges was received this week and a car of new California navel is expected next week. The market is well supplied at a reasonable basis. Quotations in oranges are slightly higher as a result of an urgent demand from over the country and a falling off in the Eastern crop, as compared with a year ago.

The range in green vegetables is improving, with a better movement from the Pacific coast. Everything in the heavy vegetable list is as cheap as ever, and consumption is reported to be expanding, as householders are showing more of a disposition to bring their living costs in line with the down through selecting the ordinary staples to a winter extent.

As had been predicted, supplies of medium and lightweight turkeys proved sufficient to meet the holiday demand. Prime dressed turkeys were quoted at 45 cents a pound wholesale. A good demand was also experienced for fowl, geese and ducks, in which a wide range was offered.

Meats Lower. The market in meats is rapidly working down to a pre-war basis. Beef

prices were marked down substantially this week as a result of weakness in the cattle market at packing points. Quotations in butter are off a cent at 58¢62 cents a pound wholesale. The easier situation in butter has been brought about through imports liberal at Atlantic ports. Prices in fresh eggs are unchanged at 62¢65 cents a dozen wholesale and 57¢60 cents a dozen for storage. As large quantities of eggs are now coming out of storage, and with the greatly reduced stocks put away, it is predicted that they will be completely exhausted early in the season. An illustration of the shortage of stocks in Eastern warehouses, a Duluth operator mentioned that he had received an inquiry yesterday for thirteen cars of eggs for Buffalo delivery.

**POSSESSION IS
VIOLATION PROOF**

Drug convictions over the United States have been facilitated by the ruling of Judge Egan Morris in the United States district court at Minneapolis this week that the possession of packages of narcotics with the revenue stamps lacking indicated purchases from other than legitimate sources and hence was a violation of the Harrison narcotic act, according to Joseph M. Bransky, narcotic group chief for the Northwestern division.

The defense contended that it was not the purpose of the Harrison narcotic act to place the burden of its enforcement on the purchaser, as would be the case if the purchaser were required to see in it that the drugs he bought were in original stamped packages.

William Anderson, assistant United States district attorney, said that due to the revenue requirement of the Harrison act the government had a right to require purchasers to see that it was not defrauded and hence could hold them responsible if they had in their possession other than stamped packages.

The government has the authority to say that the purchaser must buy a stamped package or from a stamped package. Judge Morris declined in his decision. "The government has the right to levy a tax and can pass any law for the enforcement of that tax." "The decision of Judge Morris will assist us here in securing convictions in cases now pending," Mr. Bransky explained. "It will enable us to make arrests in many instances where we have heretofore been unable to proceed and it will make possible a more effective enforcement of the Harrison narcotic act in the United States."

Deated by Tomalty.

Washington, Nov. 25.—Secretary Tomalty yesterday denied that he had advised leaders of the bituminous coal strike last fall to call off the strike under penalty of exclusion from mail and telegraph facilities, as stated by John L. Lewis, president of the United Mine Workers, in an address at Belleville, Ill. Tomalty also denied that he had told strike leaders that troops would be used should the walkout continue.

DECLARE PEIRCE WAS KILLED BY STRANGERS

Wholesaling, W. Va., Nov. 25.—Peter D. Treadway and Marie Williams, giving their home addresses as Philadelphia, arrested here yesterday in connection with the murder late last Saturday night of early Sunday morning of Henry Z. 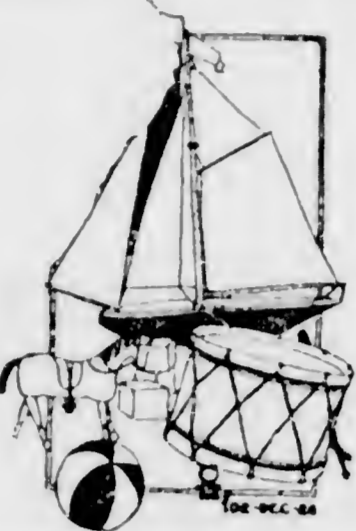

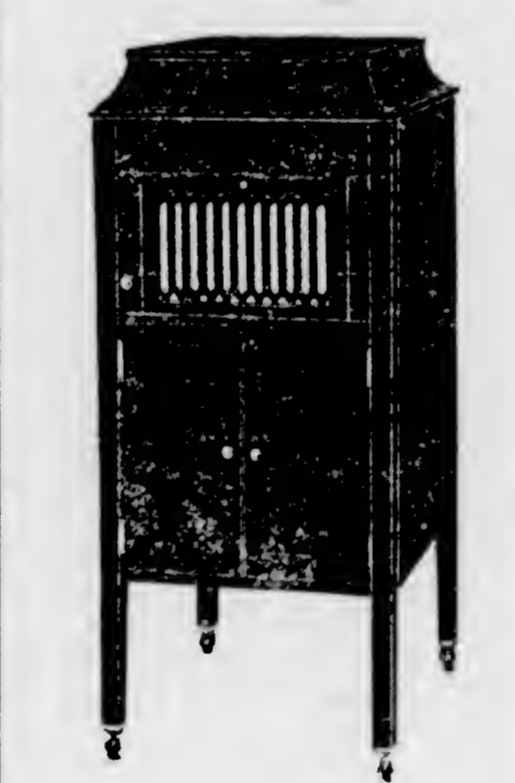

FINE SCHOOLS GOPHER PLANS

Seventy-Five Cities of the State to Expend About \$15,000,000.

St. Paul, Minn., Nov. 25.—School building programs involving an expenditure of approximately \$15,000,000 have been outlined by seventy-five cities of the state, according to an announcement today by S. A. Chaffman, state inspector of school buildings.

Minnesota proposes to invest approximately \$2,000,000 for the erection of school buildings and St. Paul is planning to expend \$1,125,000, according to Mr. Chaffman.

School building activities have been greatly retarded during the past two years and the disparity between buildings actually erected and those planned has been constantly increasing, Mr. Chaffman said. This has been due to the steadily mounting cost of construction which has upset all calculations as to funds needed in order to complete buildings under consideration. The actual cost of school building operations has been twice as great as it was prior to the entry of the United States in the world war.

Spent \$5,000,000 in Two Years.

Despite the high costs and the various other difficulties encountered in building activities, school buildings involving an aggregate cost of \$5,000,000 have been erected in Minnesota during the past two years, according to a report of Mr. Chaffman. Contracts have been let and construction is under way at the present time, Mr. Chaffman said, calling for an expenditure of \$10,000,000 for new buildings.

"While there has been considerable discussion as to the advisability of constructing temporary buildings to

meet the most urgent needs," Mr. Chaffman said, "only a very small amount of money has been expended for such purposes."

"Except in a few instances where prudence would dictate that temporary or portable buildings should be constructed, in order that facilities for an education might not be denied, a large number of children," Mr. Chaffman added, "the policy of erecting permanent and properly equipped buildings has been generally adopted."

The three-story school building is being supplanted by the safer and more serviceable two-story building, both above ground, Mr. Chaffman said, while the basement will be used for nothing except the mechanical department of the various classes in these activities.

Much progress also has been made in the sanitary appointments of buildings. Toilet rooms are now generally distributed on each floor and omitted in the basement, except in conjunction with shower bath rooms. The cooperation of the state board of health, Mr. Chaffman said, in regard to water supply and sewage disposal has been of great value in bringing the school buildings of the state to the forefront.

Typical Buildings Erected.

Typical buildings, such as are desired by the various school districts, have already been erected in numerous cities and towns of the state. Some of these cities and towns are Adams, Crosby, East Wing, Richfield, South St. Paul, Staples, Thief River Falls, Waite Park and Watwood.

Buildings typifying the model school are under construction in the following towns and cities: Deer Creek, Ely, Kettle River, Lake Elmo, Minneapolis, Nashvank, Newbald, North Mankato, Owatonna and Pemberton.

Buildings varying in cost from \$200,000 to \$300,000 are being planned at Annandale, Bemidji, Chisholm, Duluth, Forestville, Litchfield, Lonsville, Marshall, Renville, Wason and Wayzata.

Hibbing is planning to erect a high school at a cost of more than \$1,000,000. Buildings approximating a cost of from \$100,000 to \$200,000 are being planned at Atkin, Gilbert, Herman, Hutchinson, Ixonia, Levee town, Long Prairie, Montevideo, Morton, Sleepy Eye, Spring Grove, Stillwater, Storden, Thief River Falls and Virginia.

Twenty towns in the state are planning to erect school buildings at an approximate cost of from \$50,000 to \$100,000.

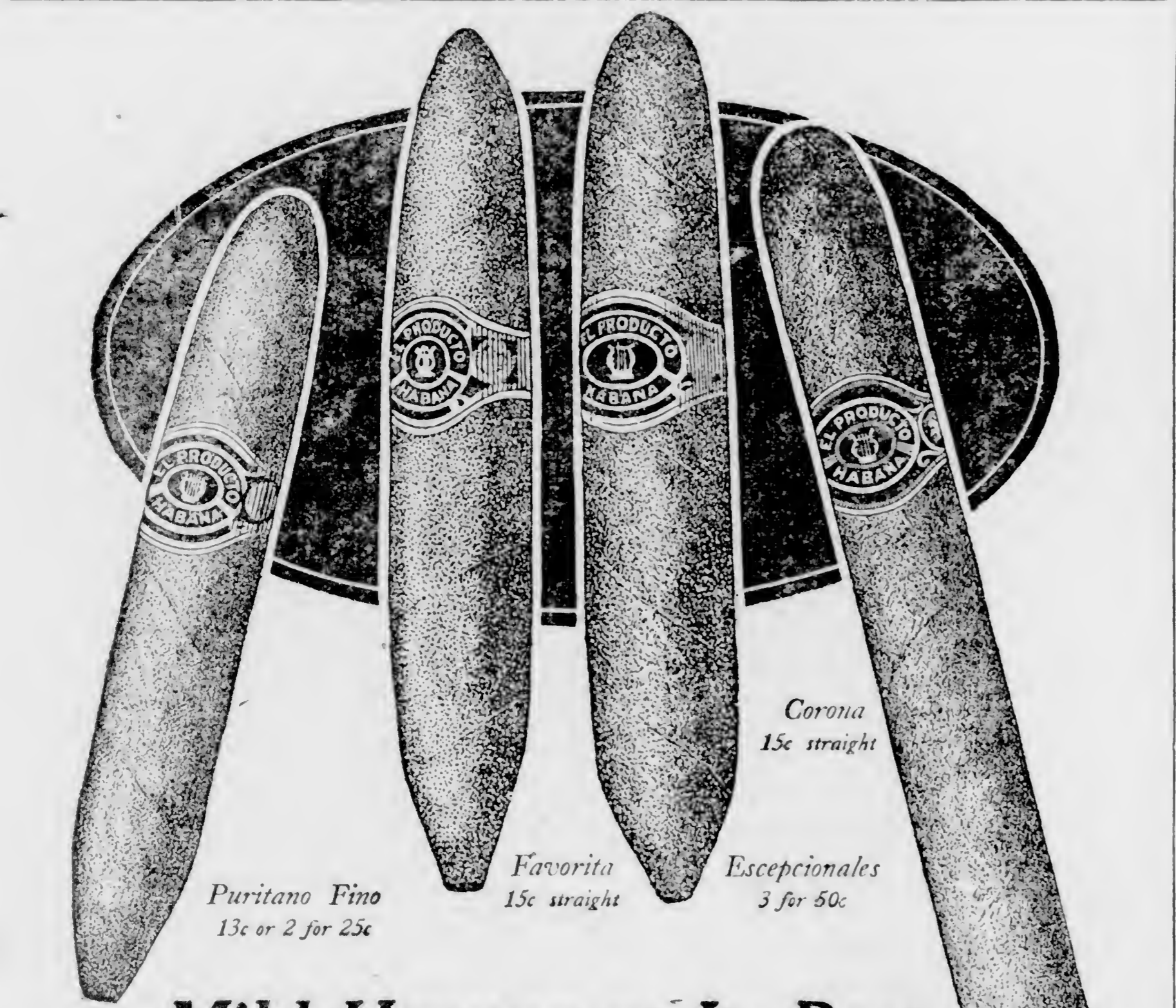

For many years it has been the custom, at the time of the year to raise funds for the combating of the spread of tuberculosis. Where in years past, the funds have been used for different lines of work, this year it will be used in another channel, that of helping disabled men and women who served in the late war.

Officials of the bureau of war risk insurance have called upon the National Tuberculosis association for consultation and expert advice in the development of plans for the best possible care for the treatment of every World War service man and woman who is disabled on account of tuberculosis. The treatment work is being financed with part of the \$45,000,000 appropriated by congress last July to the war risk insurance bureau.

The fight against tuberculosis for the nation generally is directed by the National Tuberculosis association, which is a white flag of the world. In this state, the fight against the deadly disease is waged through the National Tuberculosis association, which is an affiliated county public health association. ON BEING POSITIVE.

DON'T you hate pessimism in matters of opinion? Don't you hate it in others and resent your share of it when you find it in yourself? Almost always when I've been positive I have come to regret it afterwards.

I never hear anyone who has not tried action bridge declare that he prefers his what without remembering how positive it was. I've learned, that I, too, could never like another as well as I did. And I promise myself I will never be so positive again.

And then there's Christian Science. How virtuously positive I used to be against that! Not that I have become a Scientist, by any means, but I have come to see that there may be some things in heaven and earth that are dreamed of in my philosophy.

Positiveness Causes a Quiet Smile.

Positiveness always defeats its own ends because it never convinces. We are apt to smile a quiet inward smile at the man or woman who is always positive about things—if we are too polite to smile outside.

"Of course, it is a splendid thing to know what you know, but that isn't being positive, that's being sure. We like to meet people who are sure about things that they have reason to be sure of. They give you a feeling of dependability. For instance, what joy is the one-man-in-ten who, when asked the time, will not say, 'Well, my watch says that—about 10, but it may be a few minutes slow. I'm not sure,' but will haul out his watch, tell you the time and say that he knows it is right within thirty seconds.

The same man will give a date or a number or an amount or a price if he knows it. And if he doesn't know it he will not try to give you a number or a price. He'll say, 'I'm not sure on matters of opinion.'

But one cannot be sure over things that are matters of opinion. One can only be positive about them. It doesn't cost any more to qualify statements of opinion, or of facts, than it does to state them absolutely, with an "I think."

It doesn't cost any more to present them quietly instead of with violence. After all, it is not an insult for people to differ from you in opinion, you do not need to grow hot and the collar about it.

And then when you are sure about anything you will receive a great deal more attention and confidence.

No Sickness From Chlorine; Commissioners Meet Civic Council.

The members of the city council were guests of the Duluth Civic Council at a luncheon at the Duluth Commercial club yesterday noon. They were invited to present and discuss with the civic council the subjects of the water supply and law enforcement. While there was some discussion of the water, little was said of the other question, this having been virtually settled for the time being, with the appointment of Maj. W. E. He asserted there was no foundation to the stories that women had become sick from breathing the fumes of the chlorine in the water, as there was no taste or odor from it. He gave the amounts other cities were using in their water systems, most of which were using much more than Duluth.

Commissioner Farrell also talked of the water and sewer conditions in the city and declared Duluth was as free from sewer troubles as any city in the country. The only possibility of any trouble now was when there was a heavy northeaster blowing, and that was not often, he said.

WHITE PINE BLISTER IN ST. LOUIS COUNTY

St. Paul, Minn., Nov. 25.—(Special to The Herald.)—White pine blister disease has been found within thirty-five miles of the Minnesota-Canadian border, according to A. G. Huggins, state entomologist, who is co-operating with the Minnesota Forestry and the bureau of plant industry, Washington, D. C., in fighting the disease. Two new specimens recently discovered at Tower in St. Louis county and at Knife River, near Two Harbors, show that the disease has spread far into the native pine area of the state. This is the first time white pine blister has been found in the leaves of all known kinds of car-pine and spruce-pine bushes. The state forester has charged all eradication work and will assist owners who wish to protect their trees. White pine blister rust does not attack Norway pine. The new information found this year in Canada, Wisconsin, Idaho, and St. Louis counties show that the Federal quarantine against the blight of current and spruce-pine bushes west of Minnesota must be strictly enforced to prevent blight from disease from being introduced into the pine areas of the Far West.

WOULD ELIMINATE ALL SPORTS TODAY

New York, Nov. 25.—Enactment of laws calling for strict enforcement of the thirteen amendments to the constitution of the state, at least thirty-five states during 1921, the Lord's Day alliance announced here today. An effort will be made to stop "commercialization" of the day, according to Dr. Harry L. Howland, secretary of the alliance, with committees in every town and city. The alliance, according to Dr. Howland, will support the professional labor and business interests which now close their doors on Sunday. Father of Chippewa Victim of War Takes Life. Conduway, Wis.
